Serving Internationals On Campus

HOSTING A STUDENT IS A TWO-WAY STREET OF JOY

For a recent Thanksgiving, we gathered with family and friends to enjoy the traditional holiday feast of turkey, stuffing and pumpkin pie. Then we wrapped up the evening by learning some traditional Persian dances.

This mashup of cross-cultural traditions is just one of the many joys of welcoming an international student into your life.

My family has lived just miles away from Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville for many years, but we had never had much interaction with the university community until a couple

years ago, when the leader of our church's mercy ministries mentioned that an organization at SIUE that supports international students was looking for additional host families. With some trepidation, my husband and I, along with two other families from our church, signed up.

Our family initially was assigned to serve as host family for two female students, one from Iran and one from Poland. Although we got to spend only a limited amount of time with our student from Poland, who returned home earlier than planned due to the onset of the pandemic,

each of these students has been a blessing to our family's life, and our student from Iran is truly a part of our family now. She's been with us on holidays such as Thanksgiving, Christmas and the Fourth of July. She's gone on outings with our church youth group. She's celebrated our children's birthdays with us, and we've celebrated her birthday with her. She taught us about the Iranian New Year, even teaching us to say "Happy New Year" in Farsi so she could send a video of us, her American family, offering a greeting to her family back home in Iran.

As a host family, we simply provide support to our student. She lives on campus and is fully independent, but we take her grocery shopping, help her navigate issues such as setting up a cell phone plan and finding an eye doctor, and work with her through the difficulty of writing research papers in a language that is secondary for her. We strive through each interaction to show her the love of Christ.

In exchange, she has taught my husband and I and our three children so much about Persian culture. Beyond attempting Persian dancing (some of us more successfully than others), we've visited Persian restaurants with her, where she does all the ordering and we enjoy eating whatever she's selected. She's come to our home and cooked some of her favorite meals for us, she's introduced us to the traditional music she loves, and her mother has even shared recommendations with me for the best Persian teas. She has made herself at home in our midst and now

introduces our daughters to her friends as her sisters and calls our teenage son by his family nickname.

And all of this happened much more naturally than I anticipated. I was nervous before meeting our students. My own children are still in high school and grade school, and I was insecure about interacting with a college student, much less one from an entirely different culture. But I was set at ease almost immediately. A friend from church whose family also signed up to serve as a host family told me that other members of her family tried to discourage her from getting involved, telling her she didn't know anything about

international cultures. Her reply was that she did know how to be a mom and provide support – and hugs – when needed. I believe her perspective is correct. You don't have to be an expert in international relations. You just have to have a heart that is willing to share the gifts God has given you with a person who is a stranger in a strange land. It's what God has called us to do. "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God." Leviticus 19:34

It may sound intimidating, but it's probably easier than you think to get involved with international students. Contact your local university to find out if they have support programs already in place where you could get involved. Or if you're in a university town, find out if any of your local churches have such programs in place. Or contact ISM to learn more about possible opportunities.

Sometimes an international friendship is closer than you think.



THE TWO-WAY JOY OF BEING A CONVERSATION PARTNER

AST SPRING, I RECEIVED a call from a church friend, which ✓ ended up being a ray of sunshine in the midst of a long stay-at-home season brought on by the pandemic. My friend Betsy, a board member at Friendship House MSU, asked if I would consider being an English conversation partner. Betsy shared her own experience as a conversation partner. She said it was a one-hour-per-week commitment. All it required was showing up and having a conversation.

For context: I am a former high school English teacher who recently — in the wake of the pandemic — become a stay-at-home mom. Quite honestly, Betsy's question was an easy one to answer. Yes! Of course I could carve out an hour a week for conversations with a woman from Colombia.

And what an amazing series of and gun ownership in the United States. conversations I've had since then.

Zoom, and some of those early virtual meetings involved technical glitches that made communication challenging but we powered through. We connected quickly on the topic of motherhood, and in those first few weeks, our conversations covered cooking, music, and strategies for getting a toddler to take a nap. Later, our conversations veered into vacation destinations and the COVID situation. We also tackled more complicated topics, such as home ownership, poverty, food pantries,



After we were both vaccinated and I first met my conversation partner on feeling safer, we met in person, and our conversations flourished. Our time together went from a process of getting acquainted to a process of nurturing a friendship. We went for many long walks together, we went to an art museum and

shopping together, and we even took a few dance classes together! One of my favorite afternoons was when we went to get her a library card, which opened up a world of resources for her and her two-year-old son.

I must say that in the midst of the pandemic, when the grayness of late

winter made the days feel long, that phone call invitation from Betsy was a ray of sunshine. The friendship that I've developed with my conversation partner has added a warmth and depth and richness and joy to my life that I never would have expected. My hope is that it continues over Zoom when she returns to her home country this winter.

My conversation partner and I have both acknowledged that meeting each other through Friendship House is because of God, and we are grateful for the people who have made it possible for us to connect.

Please pray for the conversation partner program at your site and consider who you could invite into the program. Your willingness to do so might become a muchneeded ray of sunshine for someone.

Here are some ideas which can be done one-on-one as a friend, or as part of a weekly or monthly meeting.

Valentine's Day ideas

- ▶ Have a discussion comparing the love of a "Valentine" to God's love (Phoenix, Arizona)
- ▶ International students and scholars make valentines cards in their own language (College Station, Texas).
- Show a heart shaped box of candy and a cross. Share about the love we show others and the love Jesus showed to us by dying on the cross. (Slippery Rock, Pennsylvania)
- ♥ Share the story of St. Valentine the Martyr then discuss either
 - **♥** What the Bible teaches about marriage.
 - The courage needed to stand up for what one believes.

Ash Wednesday

Consider inviting scholars and students you know to your Ash Wednesday service. Why might this be a good first service to invite an international student to attend?

- † It focuses on how all of us are in need of God's mercy, and how we are not worthy of our selves.
- \$\Psi\$ It is something 'special' which they might want to observe.
- † It is more simple in form than other services, so it is easier to understand.
- Φ It is often followed by a whole season of Lenten services to which we can invite them.
- † It usually includes a full explanation of why we impose ashes.
- † Anyone can receive the ashes. But some do not, so it may be more comfortable than a communion service.
- Plan to spend time with the student after the service answering their questions about the service.

CAN YOU IMAGINE BEING AN INTERNATIONAL STUDENT?

AN YOU IMAGINE being an international student in Nigeria, Saudia Arabia, China or India? I invited Concordia students attending the Beautiful Feet Missions Conference to share what they hoped someone would do if they were one. Responses included: be patient with me, continue to reach out and invite me to things, tell me about dangerous areas, teach me societal norms... Near the end of the conference, a student who read the list said, "You wrote these, right?" He was shocked to learn what excellent ideas his peers shared. I hope that as the students also marked on a world map whether the international students they knew were 'friends' or 'acquaintances' that they started to ponder how they might deepen those relationships in some of the ways they had just written about.

Inviting people to engage in ministry among internationals starts at the level of the heart. Will we see others with the

Each of us can invite God's people to join in what God is doing among internationals. Like Jen's friend, we can invite someone from our congregation to join us in meeting an ISM need. Or we can let a family know how they can also be a "friendship family" or a "host" to an international student as Angela's family is. Or maybe, we will intentionally shop at that international food store around the corner and ask someone there to tell us about what they are buying. Who knows the friendship God might develop if we ask a question and share our phone number?

BOARD POSITIONS
