America decades ago, I was trained to use a system for prioritizing my day. Tasks range from A1, most important, to C10, bottom of the list.

- A4: Classes. Varies by day but on this day breaks down to:

 - Tom and Kathy's Conversational English Class
 - Jan's Book of Romans Bible Study

A3: Conversation Partner Follow up which included:

- Recruit (New English speakers and students)
- Pair (English speakers with international students)

July is a perfect time to call: it allows time for completing an interest questionnaire and a background check so that by mid-August every international student who hopes for an American friendship family can have one!

Christian faith, but because she feels so accepted, she is willing to learn more.

All Saints has not changed. A South Korean student felt close enough to ask if he could store two suitcases in our downstairs while he is home working in South Korea. He is not a Christian, but he feels like

- A5: General Follow up on specific issues which included
 - House Inspection prep for City Inspector
 - Credit Union visit to deposit financial gifts
 - Fundraising letter draft
 - Bicycles: follow up with our "Bike Guy" and/or students who need a bike, sometimes meaning I deliver the bikes to the students at their apartment.
 - Churches: Follow up with churches who could become partners with us in ministry
 - ISM: Write a news article for the Doorsteps newsletter
 - Fall: Begin recruiting teachers and schedule open house
- B1: Summer: includes two agenda
 - Cooking class/social gatherings
 - Fields Trips

A2: Personal tasks which includes:

- Doctor's appointment
- · Grocery store
- · Church Council Meeting

They aren't in order because first I simply write down everything. Then I go back and prioritize what really matters.

Bear in mind that this list doesn't account for unplanned events, for example, when two middle eastern sisters come to the house to inquire about English as Second Language (ESL) classes and you give them a tour of the house.

I give thanks for this full regimen of tasks I am blessed to work on each day. I am also thankful for the many interruptions that occur during the course of the day in service to our international students. This is the ministry the Lord has laid out before me and I am glad to be here. †

awareness of and attention to ministry opportunities. The members of Saints Peter and Paul Lutheran Church initially focused on supporting our intern, Alec, but as they supported him, they grew in awareness of ministry to internationals and their willingness to be involved.

Alec had special challenges in connecting with international students and scholars because the COVID-19 pandemic was in full swing when he began. He proactively connected with international student groups from several countries. Basically, he would introduce himself via email, start engaging through social media, and then ask if he could join them in their gatherings and learn more about their culture. I worked with him on how to share the Gospel and how to bring it up in regular conversations.

Although the internship was short
— only three months — Alec learned
a lot and gained valuable experience.
Alec lived with five other university
students in our campus ministry house
and engaged in the Bible study and
other aspects of campus ministry there.
He formed really neat relationships with
several students.

Before Alec came, Marie, a member of our congregation, was kind of a grandma to the Indian population at Michigan Technical University. She had worked in Chicago and coordinated transportation for incoming international students who were transiting to MTU. She made a point of greeting them in the way that they expected to be greeted based on their culture. When she retired, she moved near our congregation. She already had the trust of the international community so when she introduced Alec to some of her Indian contacts, he was immediately welcomed.

Some months after Alec left, the Indian students wanted to hold an outdoor tea as a way to gather together and meet members of our congregation. We agreed and they hosted it at our church. It was great. It was basically a mixer to connect and talk. They were very particular about the numbers of Americans and Indians. They wanted one American couple with so many students. They made traditional chai tea and they set up everything just perfectly. Since that first tea, we have hosted a few outdoor gatherings with the Indian community.

Now more Indians are spending time at our church and one joined our intramural softball team. We have given them tours of our worship space and have explained what happens in the different areas. Members of our church have invited some of the international students to their homes for dinner. I think 40 people from our congregation now mix with the Indian community on a regular basis.

Much of the desire for connection came from the Indian community growing from their connection with Alec. And then the church realized: there's a group that maybe we can connect with! Coming through COVID, the Indian students were so isolated in their small apartments that they really desired relationship and connection.

Our congregation is now much more comfortable relating to people of other cultures and is more aware of the opportunity for ministry. Every semester we do a forum with university faculty, staff, and students where they share what it means to be a Christian on campus. Having Alec as an ISM intern surely raised awareness of and interest in ministry to international students and scholars in our congregation. †

A SILVER LINING TO MEETING ONLINE

FOR MANY YEARS we have gathered our volunteer teachers at the beginning of the school year for a "get-together" time of sharing, learning and reviewing why we're doing what we're doing, as well as going over the calendar for the school year ahead. This has been a good time to learn from each other as well as to have prayer and a meal together as we start a new year.

When COVID-19 entered our world, many things changed for us! One good change was that now we were meeting online for English Conversation with students who would not otherwise be able to join us due to geography - they were in other states and even in other countries. The online meetings actually made it easier for some of our volunteer teachers too, since now they didn't have to plan a sometimes long commute to St. Paul Lutheran Church in Austin, where we meet for many of our English classes.

The lesson was fresh in our mind, so we could comment on what worked or didn't work in the lesson. We could also tell something special we learned from one of the internationals. Suggestions and ideas were shared quite freely and we could all learn from each other. This has been a silver-lining

to what could have otherwise been quite negative, since we all do miss meeting in-person with the students. But now that is beginning to change, and more and more students

are coming back to in-person classes. Thanks to God! †

GETTING READY FOR NEW INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS AND SCHOLARS

ver 80 congregations across the US are preparing for new international students and scholars to arrive in August. They may be deepening their relationships with the university's office of international scholars and students, the leaders of international student organizations, and Christian international students and scholars with whom they already have contact. They also encourage more people to consider becoming volunteers. They contact members of their own congregation, people in neighboring congregations and Lutheran university students.

Prayer is a key component of intentional ministry among internationals. Getting ready for August may mean forming a prayer team or setting up a system to notify existing prayer chains of needs, as well as writing up and sharing prayer requests.

Different sites take different steps to help their volunteers be ready. These include:

- Speaking at different congregations to invite more to join as volunteers.
- Having current volunteers share about their experiences and tell how God has worked in them and in those they minister among.
- Holding a training for volunteers, perhaps one specifically for LCMS students.
- Invite people to help with one specific "easy step" such as providing a ride or cooking for a dinner
- Learning about the specific interests and strengths of potential volunteers and finding ways for them to use those as they minister among internationals.

Leaders and volunteers also prepare for a variety of activities that either happen or start in August:

- Hold an open house, welcome dinner or welcome picnic.
- Host a furniture give away.
- Volunteer at the university's office of international student services.
- Attend the university's International Student Orientation.
- Attend university sponsored events for international students (meals, socials, cultural, etc.)

- Encourage international students and scholars to invite others.
- Request students' names and contact information, either at a welcome event or from the university
- Ask international students to share with you the dates and times of events on campus which it might be good for you to attend.
- Get all of the volunteers on the same page.

Commit your work to the LORD, and your plans will be established.

They prepare to provide specific services to international students and scholars such as:

- Picking students or scholars up from the airport
- Taking students to another city for visa matters

Related to these, are many logistics matters

- Develop a handout sharing date and location of each event for the 22-23 school year.
- Inform the Office of International students about the ISM events.
- Ask LCMS-U student leaders to include ISM events on the communications they post and share.

Getting ready for a good start in August is not easy. Of course, no site does all of these, each one does the ones that fits their context. How might you help the site nearest you to get ready for August? Please ask God to guide each of the 80 ISM sites to prepare well. Perhaps you can pray through this list once a week until the end of August. Please ask God to open doors for sharing God's love and hope with each student and scholar. †


