As you know, our campus ministry is Lutheran – intentionally, and with integrity and authenticity; at the same time, we serve any and all, and seek to do so winsomely in the name of him who is Lord of all. As we serve and connect with other Christians, mutually edifying relationships have been initiated, formed, and sustained. Some of this has been through Pastor Andræ's work with the Beatrice Institute.

As far back as 1984 she and many other members were hard at work landscaping the hillside in front of the church. As she worked she darted away and then quickly returned to work. She explained that she had just shared a friendly hello to a college student who was walking across the parking lot. She had shared, as she put it, the "five-minute gospel" with him. She had shown the student that he was welcome to All Saints.

Linda and her husband recently moved to live closer to their youngest son and family in Maryland near DC. All Saints misses them terribly. We especially miss the friendly way she makes college students as well as all others feel very welcome.

The proof is in the pudding. On Christmas Day we received a phone call from Japan from a former student who had come to study at Slippery Rock University. This call is a testimony to what Christians who are friendly can do.


The student who called Christmas Day is Sam (not his real name) from Pakistan, whose family is Muslim. Sam loved being in Slippery Rock where his sweet attitude earned him many friends. He attended our Korean student meals when he could make time. He accepted our invitations to attend Sunday worship, where we

sat close to him to explain to him the service. Although we might believe that a Muslim might not be interested in friendly invitations, he was. It was pure joy when he attended two worship services. Everyone was glad to meet him. He enjoyed the service very much, especially the hymns. He wished he could be in Slippery Rock so that he could worship again. He especially loved the hymn "Immortal, invisible God only wise" (802).

Sam went on to study for a masters degree in Japan. He loves the Japanese language and would like to live there. But this is not the end of the story. All Saints Fellowship stayed in

touch with Sam letting him know that we would pray for his sick sister at his request and for him after he had suffered a bad bike fall. We told him about two dear Japanese students who had attended SRU and urged him to contact them. He did so and has become friends with them.

On Christmas Day Sam called to say Merry Christmas and to tell us he'd be listening to the Christmas story online in Japanese. How did this happen? Kenzaburo, a Japanese student who attended SRU and who had been baptized at All Saints, has a mother, father, sister, and nephew in Japan. Sam accepted our encouragement to visit Kenzaburo's family. They had a great time eating together in their home. The relationship flourishes. Kenzaburo's sister Michiko is a Christian. She is the one who offered to send him her church's Christmas presentation as he is in Osaka and she



is in Kyoto. Sam's voice was filled with joy as he told us he'd be listening to the Christmas story.

The point of this story is that friendliness opened the door to friendship so campus ministry could eventually share the names of people like Michiko with Sam.

Even though we may believe that God cannot break through to Muslims, or Japanese, or Americans, He can and does. Linda Domanski's approach is right. It is one All Saints extends to students. It is one we all can use. Being friendly helps all students to realize they can trust what we share with them. We have a great and wise God who helps us tell His story.

We are looking forward to a new semester at Michigan State University and new classes here at the Friendship House MSU. All our classes remain virtual. We continue with a cross section of English as a Second Language (ESL) classes as well as a cross section of various Bible Studies for our international community.

We have added a couple new offerings to our weekly virtual calendar. First, is two hours (an hour each on Monday and Friday) of what we call our virtual "Living Room". Designed to be an informal gathering place (like our very own living room) where our community can gather for social conversation and community building. Secondly, we added a class teaching American Sign Language (ASL) that promotes ESL while learning ASL.

We have an international family with deaf and hard of hearing children, so this has been a blessing to them, as well as a great learning tool for others.

In our virtual world we continue to be creative with building a stronger connection to a wider audience. We are carrying out and planning more social engagements with our international community. For example, for Valentine's Day, we had volunteers from a supporting congregation provide themed gift bags for adults and children. We provided 20 adult bags and 28 individual children bags to our families.

As the, relatively new, Executive Director for the Friendship House MSU, I am continually amazed at the community we have. A bit sad when individuals and families leave the area to return home or on to their next life stop in this world but also with a sense of joy with the positive impact we have made. And then the celebration when we have new members join our world, not only internationals but new English speaking partners filled by the Spirit to make a positive impact in someone's life.

In this role I have newfound respect for this quote from Gordon B. Hinckley, "Being humble means recognizing that we are not on earth to see how IMPORTANT we can become, but to see how much DIFFERENCE we can make in the lives of others."
