into the heart of a Chinese friend recently! Praise God! She shares her faith journey through these words:

I spent nearly a year in the United States, during which I came to know about Christianity. Although it was a short time, the impact of Christianity on me and my family was huge. My family or origin was quite complicated. My parents' personality was a little eccentric, which led to my out-of-ordinary parental cultivating style to some degree. It was very difficult for



me to trust others because I couldn't help thinking that people around would hurt me. I involuntarily felt anxious, fearful, angry. I hurt my family members, especially the person closest to me (my husband), then I was so guilty and regretful about what I had done, thus I pierced myself with much pain and remorse. But after spending time reading the Bible, it's better. So I do believe the Bible has influenced and transformed my life step by step.

I was a Buddhist before coming to the U.S. I was interested in the philosophical wisdom

of the Buddhist scripture and tried to explore and follow it because I deeply longed for purity and peace of mind. But sometimes I could not get it clearly and vividly. To my surprise, last year when I *stepped into church to worship* for the first time, I was totally shocked by the mysterious atmosphere at that moment. As I sang hymns with the Christians, every pore of my body opened and I was deeply touched and choked up. I enjoyed the pastor's preaching

of the gospel, which led me to experience the fresh journey of significant life. I cannot help being attracted and inspired by the Bible.

One day, when I was at Memorial Library, I fell asleep in my chair and suddenly woke up, saying "God loves everyone." At that very moment, I was totally shocked by that, and after a few seconds, I realized what that was-The Holy Spirit visited me! I was so overjoyed that I needn't have to struggle with my past anymore. So I resolutely stepped into church to worship again, and I was eager to share my holy experience with the pastor.

I thank God for loving me and protecting me from the beginning of my life; thanks to Gus; thanks to the IFC for providing wonderful free English classes and Bible study. Not only has my English improved a lot, but the most important thing is that I can have an in-depth understanding of the Bible. Thanks to church





and the wonderful services which provided opportunities to know God's Word, let me be aware of my sin, help me to follow God's footstep and transform my personality gradually. Just as the song goes, "Once I was lost, but now I am found."

I had to go back to China again for my job at the end of March this year. I solved the problem of my job thoroughly. I got a new job. What touched me during that time was that I found my parents had changed a lot in many aspects, such as the way and attitude of getting along with others and even the relationship with me. Thanks to God! In the end, I want to say to myself: "Do not take yourself seriously, but take God seriously;" "put the interest in others, not selfish ambitions;" "with a super humble heart, never lacking zeal for God."

Through baptism, my sin is forgiven and with the resurrection of Jesus my new life will

take root, sprout and be thriving inside me bit by bit. I can forgive my parents. I can love them much more than ever before. Our family will be more peaceful. I hope to be slow to anger. I will put more faith in our Almighty God! Follow His instructions! Obey His words! For ever and ever! Amen.
